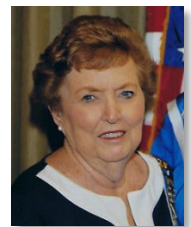
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Regent's Message

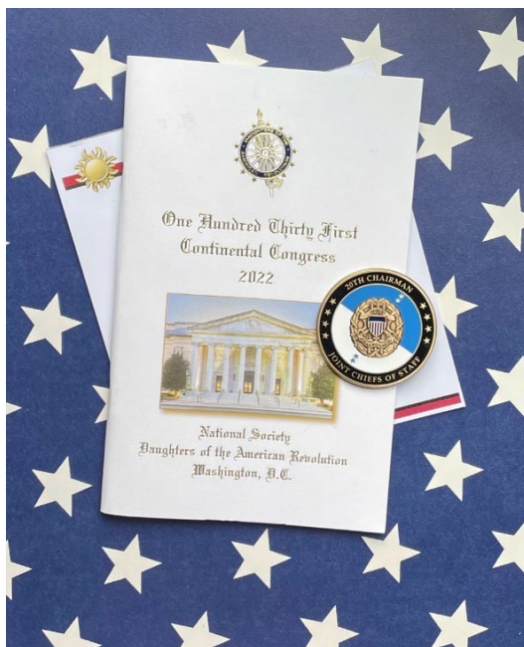

As Secretary of the Board in Tucson Chapter, Daughters of the American Revolution, I was excited to attend the 131st Continental Congress in D.C. for the first time. Flying in on June 28, I made plans to peruse the open state rooms from the basement to the third floor of the Memorial Continental Hall. Try as I might, I could not find the Arizona Room. Asking around, I discovered that they needed our room for registration, and our stuff was placed temporarily in storage. Mystery solved.

That week, I wanted to listen and learn all about what differences these women are making in America. I attended all the Morning Business Sessions, the Patriotic and Education Luncheons, AZ Delegate Meeting, Opening Night, Education Awards, Historic Preservation, and Defense Night Ceremonies, Golden West Tea, sat in the Arizona Box with State Regent Morgan Elliott, and even visited the Hillwood Estate Museum Gardens with friends. It was spectacular! I learned so much about what other DAR chapters are doing in their communities and the nation.

Saturday was extra special. We were gathered inside near the taxis at the J.W. Marriott at 4:30 PM. As we snapped a few pictures of us all dressed up, in burst a woman in white. "Hi!" she exclaimed. "You must be the Koble family." It was the first of two of the President General's pages. I was invited as a VIP to the Van Buren Reception for one of the evenings speakers, Evan Koble, prior to Defense Night. The 17-year-old served as President of A.S.C.A.R. and had won the prestigious award of National Outstanding Youth Volunteer for exemplary service in caring for America's Veterans. A President General's page was assigned to his family consisting of Evan, mom and dad, and another page was assisting Evan's sister, myself, and another guest. Evan's mom, Henrietta Koble of *Four Peaks Chapter*, has been my best friend for nearly 40 years and introduced me to DAR. I had assisted in a small portion of Evan's impressive state project and was so honored to be there for him and his family in person.

As the eight of us ceremoniously walked down to the corner to load up in two taxi cabs, I no longer had to imagine how Senators and Representatives in D.C. feel being whisked to and from fancy evening events.

One of our pages was Jamie Durham Burchfield from Texas. She has two sons in C.A.R. and was a dual CAR/DAR when she began her journey. She was Guest Hospitality in D.C., but with Evan as President of A.S.C.A.R., it was fitting that she was assigned to him. Ms. Burchfield may be a Senior Regional VP this year and is currently the National Chair for Service to America for President General Wright.

As we arrived at Continental Congress, the pages escorted us past the stanchions that held the masses back and signed us into the President General's Reception Room. The room was beautifully appointed, and the tan custom carpet with blue and red décor was stunning. There stood our President General, Mrs. Denise Doring VanBuren, with a photographer busily positioning guests to stand in front of the fireplace mantle.

In the background stood an enormous gold-leafed mirror. Our eyes searched the room. Portraits, blue and gold draperies, an antique chandelier with a golden eagle hovered over a polished table with a fresh bouquet of flowers. Purses and phones were thrust upon me as the page motioned for the family to assemble for pictures with Mrs. VanBuren. We could not believe we were mingling with her grandson, son, daughter-in-law, and an array of impressive upcoming speakers with dazzling resumes.

Showing Respect for the Flag of the United States of America

Showing respect for the Flag of the United States of America is very important to me. My parents instilled the importance of respect for our flag from an early age. My peers and their parents would never have allowed us to disrespect the flag.

I would like to review some of the basics of showing respect for the symbol of what our forefathers and foremothers created for us. Highlighted below is a very brief review of "The Flag Code" distributed by the National Society Daughters of the American Revolution, Washington D.C. from the United States Code, Title 36, Chapter 10, and Patriotic Customs.

Conduct During the Playing of the National Anthem

When the national anthem is played, all persons should stand at attention facing the flag with the right hand over their heart. Those in military uniform give the military salute.

The Pledge of Allegiance

The Pledge: "I pledge allegiance to the Flag of the United State of America, and to the Republic for which it stands, one Nation under God, indivisible, with liberty and justice for all."

Time and Occasions for Display

The universal custom to display the flag is only from sunrise to sunset on buildings and stationary flagstaff in the open. However, for patriotic effect, it may be displayed 24 hours a day if properly illuminated during dark hours. It should not be displayed during severe weather conditions. It should be displayed on special holidays, such as New Year's Day (Jan 1), Inauguration Day (Jan 20), Martin Luther King Jr.'s Birthday (celebrated on the third Monday of Jan), Lincoln and Washington Birthdays (celebrated on the third Monday of Feb), Easter Sunday (date varies); Mother's and Father's Day (second Sunday of May and June respectively), Memorial Day-half-staff until noon (last Monday in May), Flag Day (June 14); Independence Day (July 4), Labor Day (first Monday in

Sept), Constitution Day (Sept 17), Veterans Day (Nov 11), Thanksgiving Day (fourth Thursday in Nov), and Christmas Day (Dec 25).

The flag should be displayed daily on the main administration building of every public institution. It should be at every polling place on elections days, and at every school when school is in session.

Displaying the Flag

The Flag of the United States of America has the highest position, if with displayed with another flag, and is placed to the right of the speaker at a podium. It may not touch the ground. When hung, the blue section containing the white stars (the 'union') should at the first position top. It must not be displayed down unless in case of dire distress or extreme danger.

Proper Disposition of the Flag of the United States

When a flag is soiled, worn, and torn it should be taken down, replaced, and held until it may be delivered to an agency which will ensure its proper disposal, such as the worn flag storage container at the Murphy-Wilmot Library in Tucson.

If a flag is ever found lying on the ground, especially with signs of mutilation, defacement, burns, etc., it should be picked up (be aware of safety to do so) and held for proper disposal.

I fly the Flag of the United States of America at my home daily, and feel strongly that it is due our highest respect. It hurts me to see blatant and severe desecration of our nation's symbol. I am pained when I see people's disregard for the flag during the playing of our National Anthem. To me, as a Daughter of the American Revolution, distressing, disappointing, and painful are descriptions of my feelings about this type of behavior. While I believe in the values of freedom of speech, I also believe that disrespect to our dear Stars & Stripes is unconscionable. (PM)

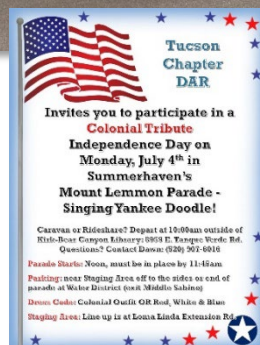

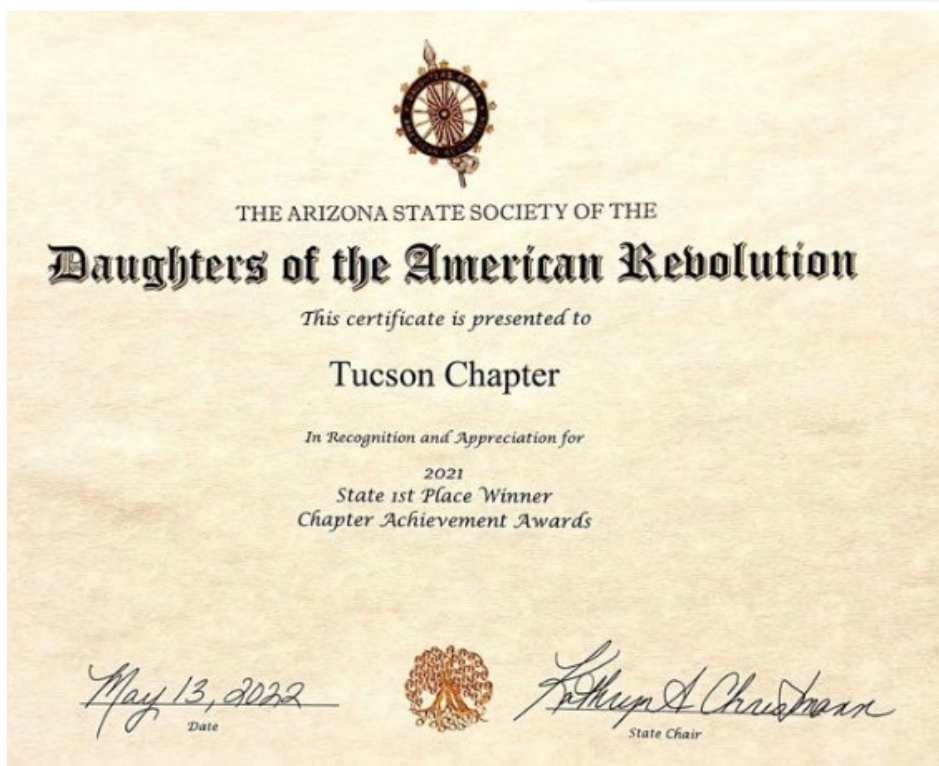


Tucson Chapter volunteers (wo)manned the registration desk and attended officer-specific workshops during the two-day event.
